Railroad Crossing to Permanently Close

Beginning Monday, January 19, the at-grade railroad crossing on Ross Wright Road in Polkton will permanently close as part of the Polkton Rail Siding Extension project, a long-term effort aimed at improving rail safety and efficiency along the CSX SF-Line and Queen City Express corridor between Charlotte and Wilmington.

Ross Wright Road begins at Highway 74 directly across from Peachland-Polkton Elementary School.

Officials say the project is designed to reduce rail congestion and improve operations along this busy freight route, which plays a key role in regional commerce and transportation throughout North Carolina.

The current phase of the project includes extending a siding track along the south side of the railroad, generally located between Freedom Road and east of the bridge at Boston Avenue, as well as the permanent closure of the Ross Wright Road railroad crossing.

A second phase of the project is scheduled further down the road, with right-of-way acquisition planned for 2029 and construction anticipated in fiscal year 2032. That phase includes building a new two-lane roadway on a new alignment from N.C. 218 to U.S. 74, just west of Martin Street, while maintaining access to and from Polkton along the existing N.C. 218 corridor.

Plans also call for construction of a new bridge carrying the roadway over Peachland-Polkton Road and the railroad, along with two new intersections providing access to Peachland-Polkton Road and U.S. 74 near Horne Town Road. U.S. 74 will feature a reduced-conflict intersection design, limiting movements to right-in and right-out turns to enhance traffic safety.

New Anson County Middle School Nears Completion, Officials Say

Construction continues on the new Anson County Schools middle school, with work progressing toward an anticipated opening in 2026. The project broke ground in May 2024, and district officials are targeting occupancy by the summer of 2026.

The new school is located adjacent to Anson High School, with the entrance on Anson High School Road.

District construction updates provided through late 2025 show steady progress. Three-quarters of the exterior pavement around the building is complete, most interior painting has been finished, classroom tile installation is underway, and heating and air-conditioning systems are installed. Teachers and administrators report that the building “is beginning to look and function like a school.”

Superintendent Dr. Brian Ratliff and project managers have noted that the fall weather helped landscaping efforts, and the overall project remains on track despite typical seasonal challenges. District and county officials have conducted multiple tours of the site, including a board of education walkthrough and a session with the Anson County Board of Commissioners, highlighting local collaboration on the effort.

When finished, the new middle school will be a modern, approximately 135,000-square-foot facility designed to support a comprehensive educational program in a contemporary learning environment.

More details on phases of construction and district plans for the new middle school are expected to be released as the project moves closer to completion.

The Origins of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day

Monday, January 19 is Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day is a federal holiday honoring the life, leadership, and legacy of Martin Luther King Jr., one of the most influential figures in American history. Observed each year on the third Monday in January, the holiday commemorates King’s commitment to civil rights, equality, and nonviolent social change.

King Jr. was born on January 15, 1929, in Atlanta, Georgia, to the Rev. Martin Luther King Sr. and Alberta Williams King. Raised in a deeply religious household, King grew up immersed in the traditions of the Black church, where his father served as pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church. From an early age, he witnessed both the strength of faith-based community leadership and the harsh realities of racial segregation in the South.

A gifted student, King skipped two grades and entered Morehouse College at the age of 15. There, under the mentorship of college president Benjamin E. Mays, he developed a strong moral and intellectual foundation that shaped his views on justice, equality, and social responsibility. King later attended Crozer Theological Seminary and earned a doctorate in systematic theology from Boston University, where he further refined his philosophy of nonviolent resistance.

The movement to establish a national holiday began shortly after King’s assassination on April 4, 1968. Just four days later, Congressman John Conyers of Michigan introduced legislation to honor King with a federal holiday. Despite strong public support, the proposal faced years of resistance in Congress, with critics questioning the cost of an additional federal holiday and debating whether any individual deserved that recognition.

Public advocacy played a major role in advancing the effort. Civil rights leaders, labor unions, faith communities, and millions of citizens pushed for recognition, while musician Stevie Wonder’s 1980 song Happy Birthday helped bring national attention to the cause. By the early 1980s, momentum had grown too strong to ignore.

In 1983, Congress passed legislation establishing Martin Luther King Jr. Day as a federal holiday, and President Ronald Reagan signed it into law. The holiday was first observed on January 20, 1986. While it became a federal holiday at that time, some states were slow to adopt it fully. It was not until 2000 that all 50 states officially recognized the holiday.

The holiday falls near King’s birthday, January 15, and emphasizes reflection, education, and service. In 1994, Congress designated Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day as a National Day of Service, encouraging Americans to volunteer in their communities as a way to honor King’s belief that “everybody can be great, because everybody can serve.”

Today, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day stands not only as a remembrance of a remarkable leader, but also as a call to action. It reminds Americans of the ongoing work required to achieve justice, equality, and unity - principles King championed throughout his life and for which he ultimately gave his own.
