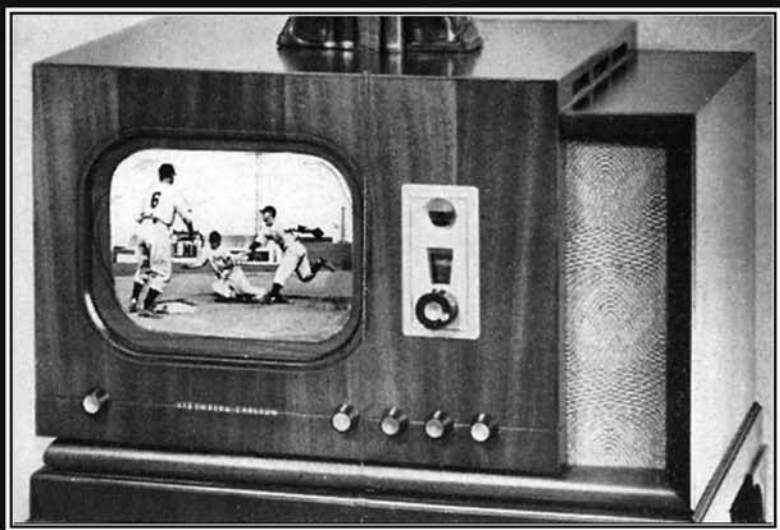

WBTB Anniversary Celebration

July 15, 1949 - 2009

After many weeks/months of "excited anticipation," WBTB went on the air with a "test pattern" on July 15, 1949. It remained that way for some period of time until all of us could get the sets in the field "set up."

In those days you didn't "just take it out of the box," plug it in the outlet and begin looking at the picture - no way. In those days each television set was removed from the carton and you installed the picture tube that was shipped in a separate carton. Then you made the necessary adjustments - yoke, ion trap, etc. Then you turned the set on and tried to get a picture or test pattern.

As safe shipping came along the tube was better protected from breakage, and this step was no longer necessary.

When WBTB went on the air, the broadcast day was short (test pattern only), but the daily broadcast time increased as time moved on. Changes, improvements, and technical knowledge advanced rapidly - some of the sets had a power transformer that

was, alone, as heavy as today's entire tv set - especially going from hand-wired sets and tubes and the like to solid state!

All this technology has changed our America so much. Other than Doug Mayes and Arthur Smith, most of the "tv beginners" have gone on!

Asked if I miss making tv service calls for \$2.50 and paying shop rent of \$25 per month - and my first new \$1,600 service truck - with not even fog lights! Well you know, it is different - instead of being 27, I am almost 87!!

Some of the original brands were RCA, Stromberg-Carlson, Motorola, GE, Sylvania - none of today's ? brands - all non USA made.

All of this as we celebrate 60 years of television reception in North Carolina with the "new" digital tv broadcasting. As Allen says, "My, that is a lot of water over the dam."
