

Silent Witnesses Stand for Victims for Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Event Oct. 30 honors lives lost and supports survivors

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, first observed nationally in 1987. The Anson County Domestic Violence and Rape Crisis Center (ACDVC) joins the observance each year through the Silent Witness Program, honoring those whose lives were taken by domestic violence, celebrating survivors, and uniting those committed to ending abuse.

Throughout October, life-sized wooden silhouettes will appear across Anson County. Each figure bears the name of someone who once lived, worked, and had family and friends—each a life ended violently by a partner, spouse, ex-spouse, or acquaintance.

Domestic violence often goes unseen and unreported. Between July 2024 and June 2025, ACDVC assisted 224 victims of domestic violence, with the highest number of cases among those ages 26 to 40. The center received 465 crisis hotline calls during that time. National data show that one in three women and one in four men have experienced physical violence from an intimate partner. According to the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, every nine seconds a woman is assaulted. From January 1 to October 1, 2025, there were 52 homicides and 17 suicides related to domestic violence in North Carolina alone.

A special remembrance ceremony will be held on Thursday, October 30, 2025, at 6:00 p.m. at the Anson County Courthouse. ACDVC invites all who have lost a loved one, been personally affected, or wish to show support to attend this meaningful gathering of remembrance and hope.
