Polkton Police Officer Shot at During Suspicious Person Call

Despite a barrage of shots fired, officer was uninjured

This is a release from the Polkton Police Chief Tim Hutchinson dated November 9: On Friday, November 8 at around 10:00 p.m. one of our officers received a suspicious person call in the Wyndsor Down Apartment area. While enroute to the area he noticed several subjects walking through the small wooded area at the main entrance of South Piedmont Community College. Our officer went to go check these people out due to them coming from that are where a car had attempted to be stolen earlier. As the officer made his way to the suspects they all started running into the college. Our officer watched them and followed them when he noticed one suspect had a handgun.

The officer called for assistance and relayed that one subject had a gun. The subjects ran down and around the building and our officer stopped waiting on backup. Our officer was First Baptist Church on Lee Avenue in Wadesboro. "We need not walk alone." stepping out of his patrol vehicle and was met with a barrage of gunfire from one of the subjects. The officer took cover and did not return fire and gave the information out over the rad

After getting to a safe distance the officer noticed that the patrol unit had been struck multiple times and was inoperable. We are just thankful that our officer did not get injured in this incident. In a second release on Saturday, November 9 Chief Hutchinson said, "Let me start this post by saying two things. I am thankful our officer was not hurt, and thank you to surrounding agencies that responded with assistance. We need everyone to share the pictures of the suspects

that tried to kill our officer last night. To the shooter I will not give up until you are in jail for attempted murder of a police officer. If you know something say something. These people tried to kill a police officer last night for trying to do his job.

The images are not clear, but can still help with identifying the suspects. There is a video of the suspects on the Polkton Police Department Facebook page.

This is an ongoing investigation and a Facebook post will be done shortly.
